Monday, March 3rd is Crossover Day under the Gold Dome. All bills that fail to pass through their chamber of origin will ultimately die in the 2014 legislative session. Where do our bills stand?

		Invest Georgia Fund is created as a separate fund
		maintained by the board and will be capitalized through
		grants from the existing Seed-Capital Fund, designated
		State appropriations to ATDC, and private contributions
		to the board. The capital raised will be periodically
		distributed to the venture capital funds selected by the
		fund administrator. State funding will be dispersed
		annually over a five-year period in the following amounts:
		\$10 million; \$10 million; \$15 million; \$25 million; and
		\$35 million. This bill has not been addressed in this
		session.
<u>SB370</u>	(1) Carter, Buddy 1st	SB 370, sponsored by Buddy Carter, would change the
		current code relating to pharmacists and pharmacies to
		add the terms "biological product" and "interchangeable
		biological product." It has been referred to the Health
		and Human Services Committee.
<u>HR1038</u>	(1) Stephens, Ron 164th	HR 1038, sponsored by Representative Stephens of the
		164th, proposes to encourage the Georgia Department of
		Education, the Technical College System of Georgia, the
		University System of Georgia, the Governor's Office of
		Workforce Development, the Department of Community
		Affairs, and the private sector to work together and
		collaborate to assist in the return of manufacturing to the
		United States. These groups are key in continuing to
		develop and train our current and future workforce to
		meet the challenges of an ever-changing manufacturing
		environment. Ultimately, this collaboration and continued
		innovation will increase the economic stability of our state
		and strengthen the global economy. It is currently in the
		Rules Committee.
<u>SB167</u>	(1) <u>Ligon, Jr., William 3rd</u>	(Monitor) Sponsored by Senator William Ligon (R -
	(2) <u>Loudermilk, Barry 14th</u>	Brunswick), this legislation seeks to establish
